MONICA BLACK is Assistant Professor of History at Furman University in Greenville, South Carolina. She received her doctorate from the University of Virginia in 2006. Her dissertation "The Meaning of Death and the Making of Three Berlins: A History, 1933–1961" was awarded the 2007 Fritz Stern Dissertation Prize. She is currently completing a book based on her dissertation.

BÄRBEL BOHLEY was one of the founders of the *Neues Forum* in 1989. In 1990 she was elected to the East Berlin City Council as a member of the *Neues Forum*. From 1996 to 1999 she worked in the Office of the High Representative in Sarajevo. She lives and works in Croatia. Her publications include *Mut: Frauen in der DDR* (Munich, 2005), coauthored with Gerald Praschl and Rüdiger Rosenthal.

WINSON CHU is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and earned his Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley. His dissertation "German Political Organizations and Regional Particularisms in Interwar Poland (1918–1939)" was awarded the 2007 Fritz Stern Dissertation Prize.

SABINE HÖHLER holds the GHI's Environmental History Fellowship in 2007/08. Originally trained as a physicist, her current research is in the field of historical science and technology studies. She is the author of *Luftfahrtforschung und Luftfahrtmythos: Wissenschaftliche Ballonfahrt in Deutschland, 1880–1910* (Frankfurt, 2001). Her current book project, titled "Spaceship Earth," explores technoscientific constructions of the environment as a closed living space during the environmental era of the 1960s and 1970s.

ERIC KURLANDER is Associate Professor of History at Stetson University and Thysen-Heideking Fellow at the University of Cologne. He is the author of *The Price of Exclusion: Ethnicity, National Identity, and the Decline of German Liberalism, 1898–1933* (New York, 2006) and is completing a book titled *Living With Hitler: Liberal Democrats in the Third Reich, 1933–1945* (forthcoming, Yale University Press).

HARTMUT LEHMANN was the founding director of the GHI Washington from 1987 to 1993. From 1993 until 2004 he was director at the Max-Planck-Institute for History in Göttingen. His most recent book is *Transformationen der Religion in der Neuzeit: Beispiele aus der Geschichte des Protestantismus* (Göttingen, 2007).

CORNELIA RAUH-KÜHNE is Professor of German and European Contemporary History at the Leibniz University in Hannover. She is the author of *Katholisches Milieu und Kleinstadtgesellschaft: Ettlingen 1918–1939* (Sigmaringen, 1991) and (with Hartmut Berghoff) *Fritz K. Ein deutsches Leben im 20. Jahrhundert* (Stuttgart and Munich, 2000).
